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## RECOLLECTIONS A Matter of Local History By Readers of The Home and Store News



IN THE 1880's, THIS WAS THE CORNER of Franklin Turnpike (left) and Cottage Place. The building was the Episcopal Epiphany Church, later moved to East Orchard Street and Franklin Turnpike. **THE FIRST EPIPHANY CHURCH** in Allendale was located at the corner of Franklin Turnpike and Cottage Place. The Parish House was built after the Church was moved to Franklin Turnpike and Orchard Street.

Before the church was built, Episcopal services were held in the home of Mrs. Stephen Cable, wife of Stephen Cable, who was an executive of the Erie R.R. Mrs. Cable's father was General Bedell.

Whenever the church and Sunday School overcrowded the Cable's two parlors, it was necessary to move church services to the barn, known as "Hope Chapel." This property is now the home of Mrs. Rose Pfister.

The Cable house was once an inn belonging to Ackermans. Mr. Cable did not like the road coming right to his door, so gave land lower down which accounts for the curve in the road.

Mrs. Cable gave very substantial aid to the church. She also donated the property where the new church stood.

Some of the early parishioners were the families of J. Morton Southwick, Rowland, Beckley, Harris, Dewsnap, Wilson, and Powell.

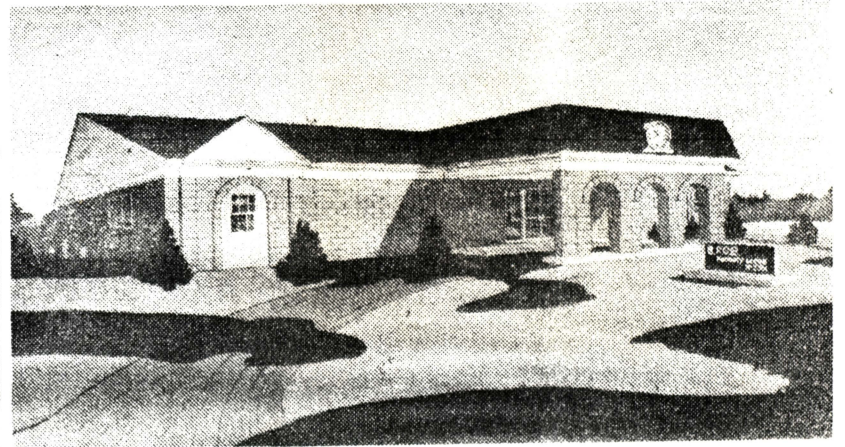
After being used for many years on Franklin & Orchard, the building was sold to the Presbyterian Church. Later, the Episcopalians built a large church at 500 Crescent Ave. It was sold to the Borough of Allendale, and serves the Borough Council, town administration, and the Library.

Episcopalians now attend services at their new church on George Street.



THIS IS MRS. STEPHEN CABLE in her late 90's when she lived at the "Home of Divine Providence" in Paramus. Destroyed by fire in the early 1900's, it stood near the present St. Andrew's R.C. Home.
